There are 62 undergraduate degree programs, 30 graduate programs within which a variety of specializations are offered, and 20 certificate programs.

- The program is designed for people working full time, with classes scheduled in the evenings, Monday through Thursday.
- Classes are small, with 25 students maximum.
- Faculty are highly accessible.
- Every student works with an adviser throughout their program.
- Internships are supervised by faculty and a professional in the field. These internships often open doors to a professional network.
- Graduates are sought after; not only because they are prepared for high-demand fields, but also because they are grounded in the real world.
- In addition to ongoing faculty and student evaluation, our programs are evaluated by practitioners in the field. Graduates are surveyed after a year of employment, and their input is incorporated into ongoing program development.
- Courses are taught by faculty with varying specializations and enriched by a collaborative multidisciplinary approach to learning.

## MASTER'S PROGRAM IN TESOL

A significant advantage of the College of Education's Master's Program in TESOL is that it combines applied linguistics and second language acquisition theory with practical knowledge in course design and instructional methods. Seattle University's TESOL graduates teach in community colleges, social service agencies, private language programs, public and private school systems, and in educational settings overseas, from kindergarten to four-year colleges. The TESOL program is open to part- and full-time students. Full-time residency is not required. Classes are offered late afternoons and evenings, except in summer when schedules may vary. Most classes meet weekly at the Seattle University campus; some classes are held at the affiliated School of Teaching English as a Second Language, also located in Seattle.

### PROGRAM FOR WORKING ADULTS

Designed primarily for working adults, the Master's Program in TESOL is for part-time students who take one or two courses per quarter. Classes are held once weekly at the Seattle campus in late afternoons and evenings. Some classes are held off campus at the School of Teaching English as a Second Language.

### THE SCHOOL OF TEACHING ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE

Seattle University's College of Education and the School of Teaching English as a Second Language have a cooperative agreement that gives students many choices in electives. Students in all TESOL programs take 1 to 4 courses off campus at the School of Teaching English as a Second Language.

Two master's degree options through the College of Education require 48 credits to receive a Master of Arts in Education (MAEd) or a Master of Education (MEd) degree.\*

### APPLICATION PROCEDURES

- Applications from the Graduate Admissions office are accepted for each quarter: July 20 for fall; November 20 for winter; February 20 for spring; May 20 for summer.
- Deadlines for international students are listed on the International Student Application.
- Request transcripts from all colleges/universities sent to Seattle University or to the applicant. If mailed to the applicant, they must remain in their sealed envelopes.
- Submit the two recommendation forms in sealed envelopes, signed across the flap by recommenders. Applicants must not break the seal.
- Applicants with a GPA below 3.0 must request GRE or MAT scores sent to the Graduate Admissions office directly from the scoring agency.
- A completed application form and supporting documents must be sent, with the application fee, in one large envelope to the Graduate Admissions office by the required deadline. We encourage early applications.

### ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

- Bachelor's degree with 3.0 GPA from an accredited college or university
- Applicants with less than a 3.0 GPA must submit GRE or MAT scores taken within the last five years.
- TOEFL score of 580 (92 internet-based or 237 computer-based score) or higher for any applicant for whom English is not the native language. (Equivalent MELAB and IELTS scores are also accepted to determine English proficiency.)
- Two or more letters of recommendation from recent employers/supervisors/professors
- Although not required for admission, we recommend that students whose first language is English be proficient in another language to enhance their effectiveness as an ESL instructor.
